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DOES IT MATTER WHERE YOU GET YOUR NEWS?

Fairleigh Dickinson University, December 17, 2018– Garden Staters prefer to get their news by watching rather than reading, according to the most recent statewide survey from the Fairleigh Dickinson University Poll. But people should beware, as not all sources are created equal when it comes to staying informed about important people, events, and in the age of the Trump presidency, scandals.

The most relied up on source for news are cable news networks, such as CNN, Fox News, and MSNBC. A third (33%) report this is as their favored source, with news from a website or app coming in a distant second (23%). The only other source to break double digits are the evening network news programs such as ABC World News Tonight, CBS Evening News, and NBC Nightly News. Print newspapers and radio tie at seven percent each as does the much-discussed-of-late social media news landscape, with seven percent reporting Facebook, Twitter and the like as their preferred source.

Republicans (43%) gravitate toward cable news more than Democrats (27%) and Independents (27%), as Trump supporters over Trump critics (44 v. 26%), whites over nonwhites (35 v. 24%), and anyone 35 to 54 and 55 plus as compared with the 18-34 crowd (30 and 41% v. 15%).

“Two takeaways emerge from our consideration of news sources: First, opinion journalism has a far greater appeal among Republicans than Democrats across the state. And second, with almost half of Millennials (47%) reporting their preference for digital news on the Internet over other sources, it’s clear that this will continue to be where the action is when it comes to new and evolving news media platforms,” said Krista Jenkins, a professor of politics at Fairleigh Dickinson University and the poll’s director.

The same survey asked about specific sources among respondents who selected newspapers, cable news, social networks, and news on the web on an app. Most could not name a specific source, but cable news watchers were more definitive, and Fox News draws the most viewers. Of those who selected cable news as their go to source, 45 percent identified Fox News, with fewer choosing CNN (31%) and MSNBC (17%).

Perhaps unsurprisingly, partisan differences are also evident, with a majority of Fox News watchers identifying as Republican (92%). CNN draws heavily from self-identified Democrats (70%), as does MSNBC (92%). The same is true for attitudes toward President Trump. Fox News viewers heavily support the president (98%); CNN (91%) and MSNBC (93%) attract viewers who are critical of the president.

“The intersection of partisan politics and news is alive and well in the Garden State. Republicans and presidential backers clearly appreciate the defensive posture of Fox News. His detractors and Democrats look for news that is more critical of the president,” said Jenkins. “Polarization among voters is reinforced by news sources and news source reinforce polarization among voters.”

What do you know and where do you get your news?

In order to gauge how effective the news is in conveying important information to consumers about what’s going on in the nation, a series of questions were asked about important personalities and events. Do people know that Paul Ryan is the Speaker of the House? Are they familiar with who is leading the investigation of Donald Trump? And do they know which candidate won the most popular votes in the 2016 election? By and large, the answer to these questions is yes, with sizable majorities answering correctly that the Speakership is held by Wisconsin Congressman Paul Ryan (69%), that Robert Mueller is heading up the investigation (74%), and that Hillary Clinton won the 2016 popular vote (82%).

However, when the focus is on the relationship between news sources and political knowledge, there are some important differences. Local TV news watchers do the worst with only 28% able to respond to all three questions correctly. Conversely, print newspaper readers do the best, as a full two-thirds (66%) scored the highest on a political knowledge index. Right behind them are cable news viewers (63%).

Beyond basic facts about some important players and events in national politics lies the unique news that surrounds the Trump presidency. As the [poll reported previously](#), respondents were also asked about an array of scandals (four in total). Two involved real events, such as the guilty plea of President Trump’s former campaign manager, Paul Manafort, and the resignation of EPA head Scott Pruitt due to concerns over his misuse of taxpayer money. The other two scandals were fictitious and involved the resignation of Secretary of State Mike Pompeo over a breakdown in negotiations with North Korea and leaked tapes from Trump’s *The Apprentice* years during which he made insensitive and racist remarks. As we reported previously, a majority knew that Paul Manafort DID plead guilty (54%) and that Scott Pruitt DID resign (55%). However, less than a majority knew that Mike Pompeo DID NOT resign (47%) and that tapes of Donald Trump from *The Apprentice* DID NOT leak (14%).

When we scrutinize scandal knowledge by preferred news sources, again we see differences with print newspapers and cable news watchers doing the best. A third (34%) of print newspaper readers were able to correctly answer at least three out of the four scandal questions correctly, with the same (33%) number of cable news watchers scoring the same. And, as with measures of national political knowledge, local TV news viewers know the least when it comes to Trump scandals. Only about one-in-seven (15%) scored a three or more on the political scandal index.

“Keeping up with news from the White House is like trying to drink from a fire hose. My hat is off to anyone who can keep it straight,” said Jenkins.

Methodology - The Fairleigh Dickinson University Poll was conducted by landline and cellular telephone September 26-30, 2018 using a random sample of adults in New Jersey aged 18 and older (N = 805). Results have a margin of sampling error of +/- 3.8 percentage points, including the design effect. Interviews were conducted in English.

Survey results are also subject to non-sampling error. This kind of error, which cannot be measured, arises from a number of factors including, but not limited to, non-response (eligible individuals refusing to be interviewed), question wording, the order in which questions are asked, and variations among interviewers.

Interviews were conducted by Clear Insights Group of Lehi, Utah, with professionally trained interviewers using a CATI (Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing) system. Random selection is achieved by computerized random-digit dialing. This technique gives every person with a landline phone number (including those with unlisted numbers) an equal chance of being selected.

The total combined sample is mathematically weighted to match known demographics of age, sex, and race. 273 interviews were conducted on landlines and 532 were conducted on cellular telephones.

The sample was purchased from Marketing Systems Group and the research was funded by Fairleigh Dickinson University.

The Fairleigh Dickinson University Poll received an “A” rating from statistician Nate Silver’s FiveThirtyEight blog. The ratings measure both accuracy and bias for all major polling services in the United States, providing an update to similar research the poll watchers conducted in 2014. The Fairleigh Dickinson University Poll’s “A” rating puts it in the top 14 of the more than 380 polling institutes reviewed and graded from A+ through F. The Fairleigh Dickinson University Poll was found to have a 94 percent accuracy rate for predicting election results, and is one of only two A-rated polling institutes with zero bias to their rankings.
